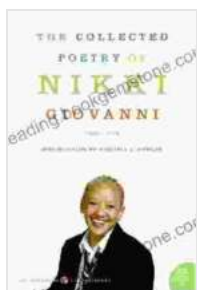

### **Middle Period (1971-1985)**

In her middle period, Giovanni's poetry becomes more political and socially conscious. She writes about the Vietnam War, the Civil Rights Movement, and the struggles of Black people in America.

Another important poem from this period is "The Great Pax Whitie," which critiques American imperialism and its impact on the Third World.

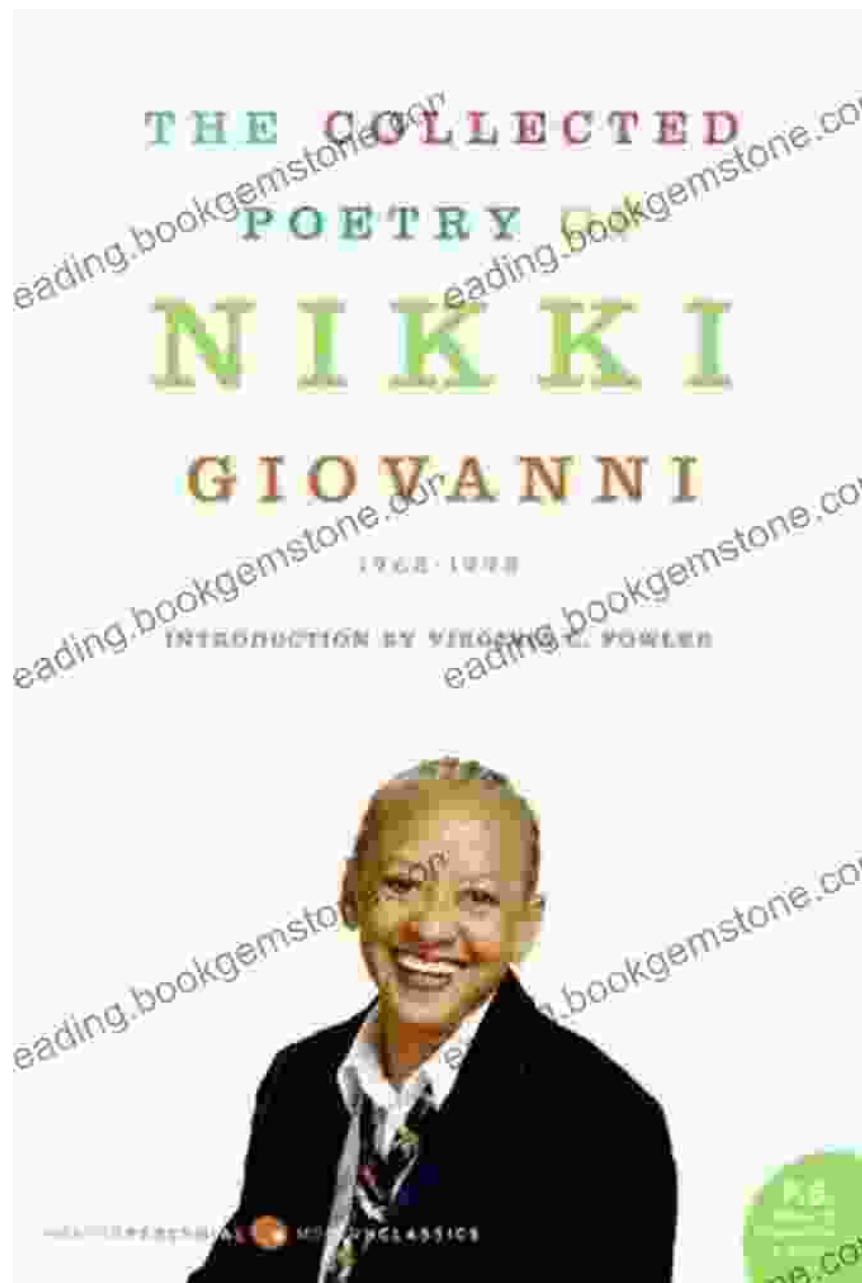


One of her most moving later poems is "Quilting," which explores the complex relationship between mothers and daughters.

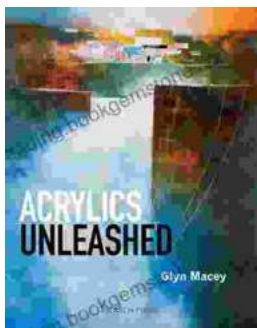


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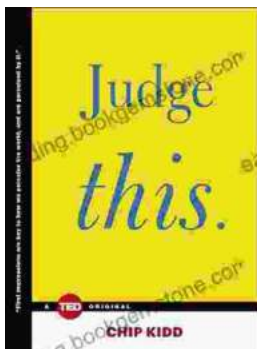
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
