
The Last Sanctuary From The Holocaust: A Hidden Haven Amidst Darkness




The Last Sanctuary stood as a testament to the resilience and determination of the Jewish people during the Holocaust. It served as a

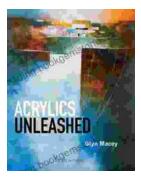

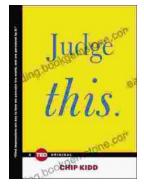
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
